"The Passport Club" Instructions

What: The Passport Club is a celebration of cultures around the world. In the student's journey to study people from all walks of life they will see diverse cultural backgrounds as well as universal similarities.

Why and benefits: Students that know about their world and its people are more open and accepting and able to work together through their cultural differences. Geography and cultural studies are important now, more than ever.

Who: This unit study is adaptable for upper-elementary, middle school and high school levels with great success.

When: This 50-60-minute class is written for a teacher presentation once a week and student research the rest of the week.

On the website under each continent you will find:



PASSPORT BOOK- This is the student's book to fill in as they study different countries. Students will research (online and with books) a country, of their choice, within the monthly continent. They will glue, draw, and write in their books depending on age and ability. The back of the PASSPORT BOOK has a list of activities in the book. Each activity is worth 5 points. Students need to earn 40 points to complete the unit and receive credit. To motivate students to explore more about their country, they can earn a "charm" by

completing 12 or more activities.

MAP- Each map has two pages. This is to make the map large enough for students to fill in all of country names and geographical features. Match up the pages and tape them together. Punch holes to keep in student 3 ring binder. Students will color and fill in the countries and geographical features of the continent on the first and second weeks.





QUIZ- Students are quizzed to know the countries on the continent they are studying. Each QUIZ is the same. Our goal is memorization. The final QUIZ on the fourth week. Optional: students can use their maps to fill in the QUIZ.

WEEKLY ACTIVITIES- Each continent is divided into four weeks of activities. These activities are just a springboard of ideas that can be done in class to introduce students to our wonderful world.

How to Start:

Each month of the school year a new continent will be studied. This is my preferred order, but they can be taught in any order. Each continent is a separate unit.

- September- USA
- October- Canada & Central America
- November- Europe
- December- (no continent study)
 "Christmas Around the World"
- January- Africa

- February- South America
- March- Asia
- April- Australia
- May- Personal Projects and "End of Year" party

Earn Your Charm!

On the last page of the **PASSPORT BOOK** there is a list of activities. To earn a "charm" for that continent students need to do 12 activities. At the end of each unit, tally points and make a presentation of the charms. If YOU make it a BIG deal, it will be a big deal!

Charms can be anything to represent different continents... we gave the kids a keychain and made charms out of international stickers from the craft store glued on craft foam paper. Another year we made charms out of baked clay.



Show and Share

The last week of each unit students will share what they learned about their country with the group. Depending on the size of the group, students can share their whole book or just a few pages of the **PASSPORT BOOK**.

Before First Class

- Find a world map or globe to display
- Print out PASSPORT BOOK and MAP; one for each student
- Make an example of the MAP to show
- Make an example of a PASSPORT BOOK with information
- Decide how you will introduce students to this continent (look at Supplemental Activities)

First Day of Class:

- Welcome students! Show a globe or world map
- Introduce continent, where it is, and its contribution to society and the world; share things that are interesting about this continent.
- Hand out and explain the MAP
- Talk about famous landmarks, showing where they are on the MAP
- Hand out & explain the PASSPORT BOOK, go through each page so students know what is expected. Each student will choose a country in the continent to study for the whole month.
 They will take notes in the PASSPORT BOOK
- Depending on time, you may want them to start labeling countries in class on their MAP
- Student homework:
 - Color and fill in names of countries on MAP
 - Start working on their PASSPORT BOOK activities. They should complete 3+ activities a week.

Each month will follow the same routine. The Teacher/Parent's creativity and passion will come out as they teach about different countries.

Students will need for class each week:

- Pencil, colored pencils
- 3 Ring Binder, to hold MAP, PASSPORT BOOK and any other handouts
- 7 page dividers
- plastic sheet protectors (to hold their PASSPORT BOOK)

Here is a list of **supplemental activities** you can use to introduce the continent or for a weekly class:

- show personal pictures and objects from a country
- invite someone that is from that country to tell about it
- make food and eat it
- learn a dance
- play games
- learn a song and sing or play it with instruments
- play a sport from that country
- do artwork (paint, draw, clay, etc.) from that country

The more the student can hold or see things from that country, the more real it becomes. Here are some examples of elementary, middle and high school activities.


